As the 2021-22 school year comes to a close, the school board and I take time to reflect on what we have accomplished, what we can do better, and integrate that information to begin planning for the next year. First and foremost, we determine if our decisions were aligned with our mission statement, "To inspire lifelong learners for future success by engaging students, staff, families and our community."

After a three-year process, the community voted to invest in its facilities to ensure learning and work environments meet the standards we expect of students and staff performance. This investment will assist to ensure that general funds are directed to people, programs, and performance. Thank you for your support of student education!

Marks of Continuous Improvement:

- Wisconsin's Department of Instruction released its annual report card and Prescott School District performed in the top 15% of all public schools in the state. This is a testament to our entire staff who continue to show up each and every day.
- ACT performance continues to remain steady and near all-time highs with nearly 100% of the Junior class participating.
- CTE Program grants have increased student exposure to new technologies, handson projects and incorporated entrepreneurial efforts.
- Accredited courses at PHS have saved families \$245,000 in college tuition costs.
- Our one-to-one technology initiative investment to place technology in the hands of students will extend to the middle school in 2022-23.
- Investment in our evidence-based early literacy program is on target to be fully implemented K-3 by fall of 2022.

PSD will continue to focus on improvement through frequent measures of student academics and growth. This data guides how we develop and implement programming to ensure we are cultivating successful future leaders.





This year we once again have much to celebrate at the intermediate

school. In the fall, the state report card showed that our students did an incredible job and our school was deemed as **Significantly Exceeding**

Expectations. When compared to all other elementary schools in the state, **Prescott ranks in the top 15% in Academic Achievement and in the top 4% in Student Growth.** Where many schools saw academic gaps form, the intermediate school has been able to elevate our outcomes. WAY TO GO CARDINALS!

WE ARE PRESCOTT HIGH SCHOOL



It's that time of year where the advent of change is all around us. Winter has evolved into spring, and spring is quickly giving way to summer. At Prescott High School, change is relentless. Students and staff are wrapping up the 2021-22 school year and looking ahead to graduation, summer school, and are deep into the planning for the 2022-23 school year. We have seen many improvements this year, thanks in large part to our staff and amazing Class of 2022, who have led numerous initiatives. This group of spectacular students has certainly been living our mission of "creating future successful leaders."

As the year comes to a close, it's important to look back at this class's successes. They led movements celebrating diversity, started an Inclusivity Club, helped PHS staff form an Enrichment Period to foster relationships and explore new possibilities, brought in guest speakers, and worked to add monthly awareness days on topics spanning anxiety, depression, eating disorders, and suicide. This class has led teams: The Forensics team earned the Excellence in Speech award given to only the top 5% of Wisconsin schools. Golf, softball, basketball, dance, and track are just a few other examples of teams led to regional, sectional, or state recognition by seniors. This group had one of the highest collective ACT scores for Prescott High School, and the highest pass-rate for AP courses in PHS history. The Class of 2022 has certainly made our school proud in their relentless pursuit of excellence.

Prescott High School staff have also been relentlessly working to add new offerings and initiatives for the 2022-23 school year. We will introduce new courses in music, technical education, computer technology, and the core areas of study. Before that point, students at the high school will have opportunities to enrich their learning through our summer school courses. With over 40 courses available, there is something for everyone.

A core goals of the PHS staff this year was a focus on R.C.C. (Relationships, Connections, and Community). To this end, we implemented an Enrichment Period once a week where students could select to learn new skills, meet new people, and create connections with new staff members. Over 92% of our students responded at the end of the year that they enjoyed the Enrichment Period and would like it offered again in the future. Furthermore, 65% said this time allowed them to create a new and meaningful connection with a staff member of the school, and 78% said this time allowed them to create a new connection with a new peer.

As we head into the next school year, Prescott High School will continue to be relentless in the pursuit of our goals to provide opportunities for students and to create strong relationships within our school community.


