The combined efforts of our staff and volunteers makes this a great place for students to grow and succeed. Be sure to give a big Prescott welcome to all of our new employees.





Annual Meeting Highlights

Prescott School District held its annual meeting on Wednesday, September 12, 2018. Highlights of the meeting include:

- State of the District report by Dr. Rick Spicuzza, Superintendent:
 - o Energy Efficiency projects that were completed over the summer will realize an annual estimated energy savings of \$44,000 and estimated rebates this year of over \$54,000.
 - Academic performance results were presented. For more details, visit the website at https://www.prescott.k12.wi.us/page/2859.
 - o Progress on the district strategic planning was reviewed. More information on this work will be presented mid-year, including mission, vision, values, and strategic directions.
 - o Financial considerations were presented.




- The budget hearing was held for the 2018-19 school year. Final numbers will be adjusted in October when state funding is finalized. The proposed budget is \$15,713,033.
- The tax levy was adopted. The estimated levy is \$8,546,956, with an average mill rate of 11.08 (which is a reduction from the prior 2 years of 12.63 and 12.25). Budget and levy details can be requested from the district office.
- Board member salaries and expenses will remain unchanged.
- Attendees voted to allow the school board to set a date for the 2019 annual meeting at a later time.

Prescott School District received several grants recently to fund important projects for our students. Over the summer, we applied for substantial grants from the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ) to support safety initiatives and from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) to support mental health measures.

These grants, totaling over \$225,000 allowed the district to improve security at all four buildings. The safety improvements included physical upgrades, such as locks and surveillance monitoring, as well as staff training. All staff will have A.L.I.C.E. training (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) which involves instruction and drills for preparedness in the event of an aggressive intruder. Staff and students will participate in drills related to school safety, similar to how we practice action in the event of a tornado or fire.

In addition to these safety measures, the district is able to dedicate grant resources to improve mental health supports. Some of these supports include a one-year, part-time School Mental Health Navigator position who will help connect families with mental health supports in the community for their specific needs. The district is also able to increase our contract with Family Means to provide tools for staff to implement in their classrooms. The grants will support staff training in trauma informed teaching, student screening for risk factors, and educational programming on mental health topics such as depression and suicide awareness.

Along with these large grants, we are grateful for the amazing local support of targeted projects within our district. We recently reported that First National Bank contributed \$50,000 and Prescott Foundation contributed \$35,000 to develop the youth sports fields on Dexter Street.

Prescott Foundation, along with American Foundation for Suicide Prevention also provided funding for a Suicide Awareness program for students and community members this fall. The Prescott Foundation also provided support for the Memory Café at the Gathering Place. A Health and Wellness Series was initiated to provide nutritional information to at-risk families all school year through a grant from St. Croix Valley Foundation.

Ann Marie Foundation provided funding for hygiene kits to provide basic care items to students who may not have access to these items. Joy Lutheran church members partnered in compiling these age and gender appropriate kits for students. Earlier in the summer, Ann Marie Foundation supported portable pitcher mounds for Prescott Community Recreation (PCR) and drum ball kits for use with our elementary students and at the Gathering Place. Ann Marie Foundation also provided partner support for the Community Conversation Series sponsored by Community Education and for the Tomahawk Circle Drum Group that will visit our community at the end of October. Prescott students also benefitted from a recent donation of backpacks and school supplies from Pierce County Sheriff Department.

These are important and valuable contributions that directly impact our students, families, staff, and community. For that generous support, we are very grateful.



COMMUNITY NEWS AND HAPPENINGS

District Improvement Updates

If Prescott School District had a writing assignment to tell what we did over the summer, it would start with a very impressive checklist:

Complete energy efficiency projects in elementary and intermediate buildings. This intensive project involved about 30% of the space in Malone Elementary and 100% of the space in Malone Intermediate. To accommodate the project, all summer school classes and the district office were moved to the high school on the last day of school so construction could commence immediately.

Malone Elementary was updated with dehumidification in classrooms located in the 1988 addition, and HVAC control upgrades. Consolidating equipment into a central unit netted elimination of 27 individual pieces of equipment and replaced



30-year-old ventilators that were beyond their normal life span. The air quality controls will reduce building damage from condensation and provide a more comfortable space for learning and working.



Malone Intermediate received a major overhaul of systems to right size equipment from use as a high school to use as an intermediate school. Equipment replacement included whole building dehumidification, domestic hot water upgrades to high efficiency, gas booster heater for the dishwasher, and duct board replacement. Lighting throughout the building was replaced with efficient LED fixtures inside and out. In addition, ceiling tiles damaged from prior condensation were replaced. Overall, 10 pieces of equipment were eliminated in this upgrade.

The entire project will provide an estimated annual energy savings of \$44,000 and an estimated annual operational savings of \$21,000, with a capital cost avoidance of \$230,000. Along with the ongoing savings, the school district is eligible for an energy efficiency rebate, which is estimated at \$54,000.

Convert to a new student information system. The new Infinite Campus program will provide enhanced options for parent, students and staff to keep track of schedules, assignments, grades, and more. While the basic program pieces were rolled out over the summer, work continues to implement the mobile app and financial/payroll components of the program.

Implement school safety and mental health initiatives. Thanks to generous grants, we were busy fulfilling the grant projects we were awarded – from safety measures to programming and staffing. These summer preparations created a baseline for ongoing student support, staff training, and community options to improve our safety responses throughout the year.

Prepare for a new year ahead. Along with those big projects, staff continued the rolling work of staffing, financial audits, state reporting, information updates, orientation meetings, scheduling, and more for the 2018-19 school year. We also continued work on policy updates and strategic planning that will continue throughout this year. It was a whirlwind summer and we are grateful for the stamina and energy of our staff, and the support of parents and community as we worked through these important projects.

This programming will supplement existing courses and provide a more in-depth and hands-on approach to tackling STEM topics using technology and engineering for problem-solving. The K-5 program will provide foundational concepts to prepare students for the next level STEM as they enter Middle School. This is a unique program and we will continue to share information and updates throughout the year as the students learn and create projects.
