BACKPACK Program Provides Weekend Meal Needs for Students

Prescott School District participates in a "weekend food" assistance program for students through a partnership with Prescott Food Pantry. This program confidentially sends some easy weekend meal items home for a student in his or her own backpack (older students with no backpack can make another arrangement) every Friday. The food items sent are specifically designed to provide additional food for a quick meal over the weekend. These food items are easy to prepare with little or no preparation, requiring minimal adult supervision. Parents interested in participating in this program will be able to have each student from their household each receive a weekend food package.

Many families are experiencing financial strains that effect the ability to purchase enough food for their growing children. This program is confidential and will be handled discreetly. 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"The best at getting better." Those are the words we often use to express our motivation in the school district hallways and offices. This applies to academics, sports, personal behavior - basically everything we do when it comes to educating the children from our community. Integral to that process is taking time to celebrate accomplishments, reflecting on areas for improvement and working together to build actionable steps for our ongoing improvement.

This fall, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction released important assessment data that reflect the results of student learning from the previous school year. That data was reviewed by school staff and together we used our reflections on that data to set goals for the school year ahead of us.

Across the board, Prescott student results shined brightly in comparison to state results. In most cases, results also showed improvement from prior year testing. For a summary of results, please visit the district website page: http://www.prescott.k12.wi.us/page/2859.

In prior years, students who were seniors could choose to take the ACT test. Generally, students who were college-bound would complete the ACT. The class of 2017 was only the second graduating class with 100% of students participating in the ACT exam during their junior year. Results for last year's graduating seniors were especially strong and worth special note.

The first positive reflection is that Prescott students outperformed state results overall with 100% participation. The second noteworthy outcome is that the graduating seniors last year achieved above state levels in all subject areas.



This is all great news! Along with these positive trends, school staff looked deep into the data to identify areas for improvement and are focusing on those specific needs during this school year. We will especially be focusing on STEM opportunities in our middle school grades. We will continue to monitor and address gender differences in reading and math. And we will continue to close the gap between special education and general education results. Working toward getting better - in everything we do.

COMMUNITY NEWS AND HAPPENINGS

ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The Annual Meeting of the Prescott School District was held on August 30, 2017. This community-wide meeting gives residents an opportunity to hear about the state of the district and vote on important issues, including the proposed tax levy for the year ahead. The illustration below was presented during the meeting. A foundational element of a highly effective school district is financial oversight and stewardship of resources. This is where the community involvement is so vital.

During the annual meeting, attendees were presented the proposed 2017-18 operating budget and approved the resolution adopting the tax levy. Highlights of the final budget will be provided in an annual report in the winter newsletter. Other approvals included salaries and expense reimbursements for school board members, which remain unchanged from prior year. The next annual meeting will be scheduled prior to September 15, 2018.

Other information at the annual meeting included:

- State of the District presentation by Superintendent Spicuzza including accomplishments, goals, school funding topics, and trends in student enrollment and academic performance.
- Presentation by Trane on energy efficiency projects that will be funded through Act 32 funding.

As we continue to build on the success of the past and set goals for the future, we recognize there are many influencers that build an effective environment for student learning. As a school district, we value the partnerships between students, parents, staff, volunteers, community members, businesses, municipalities, organizations, leaders, and others who make our schools successful.

ENERGY EFFICIENCY PROJECTS BRING COST SAVINGS

Prescott School Board recently approved important energy efficiency projects with funding provided under Act 32 financing guidelines. With an improved financial rating of Aa3 by Moody's, the district was able to sell \$3.785 million dollars of Energy Efficiency Bonds on September 20th, with a 15-year interest rate of 2.378%. The Aa3 improved bond rating saves taxpayers over \$30,000 in interest. These savings allow us to re-invest operating dollars back into the classrooms and employees throughout the district versus banks and investors.

The energy efficiency project will provide guaranteed savings of \$29,000.00 per year. After a thorough 18-month review of our facilities, the school board approved a contract with TRANE to remove all 1969 Air Handler Units and boilers from Malone Intermediate School. In addition, a building-wide transformation to LED fixtures and lighting will occur. Most work will occur during the summer of 2018, with some work beginning as early as winter or spring break.



While finances matter, most importantly these projects improve the work and learning environment. These are important investments for the betterment of our facilities.

PRESCOTT REVAMPS WELLNESS POLICY

To strengthen our school district's commitment to lifelong wellness and optimized learning for students, we are promoting healthy eating and physical activity. This includes:

At Malone Elementary all classroom unit ventilators in the 1988 wing will be replaced with one air handler unit to dehumidify and condition the entire wing. Overall, 27 independent, non-synchronized units will be removed and replaced by three synchronized units. This will complete the initial energy efficiency project that was initiated in 2013. Payback on the \$3.785 million dollars will occur within 12 years; allowing us to be proactive and plan for the future capital investments that may occur.
