AN INVESTMENT IN KNOWLEDGE PAYS THE BEST INTEREST - Benjamin Franklin Dr. Rick Spicuzza, Superintendent of Schools

The global pandemic has affected every facet of how we function as a school district. Every decision we make as a district has an incredible impact on our families and students, and this is not lost on me or our school board. Adapting to the ever-changing circumstances of the COVID pandemic hits all of us individually and collectively. I wish we could make all of this go away, but that is not our reality. As PSD and families deal with the various instructional models on what feels like a minute-by-minute clock, our board is tasked with not only the short-term issues of COVID, but legitimate longer-term goals detailed in the board's strategic direction. A first-level responsibility of the board is to ensure the facilities are maintained and operational. These basic necessities go beyond annual budgets and require generational support by our community.

This fall, our PSD Board continued its work on a long-term, 10-year plan for the district that aligns to its mission, vision, and strategic direction. After almost three years of work with SDS Architects, the school board sent a district-wide community survey that addressed the entirety of the strategic direction with one ask: 1) address requisite maintenance needs, 2) improve safety and security, 3) optimize space utilization and, 4) align our learning spaces to our academic model. The community's response suggests it is not ready to support all four initiatives at the cost of \$16-\$22M. However, as a board and community, we have a shared obligation to ensure the infrastructure (e.g., roofs, electrical work, boilers, etc.) remain up-to-date. December and January will be critical months for our board as they are challenged to make decisions in the best interest of students and staff, while protecting the investment that generations have provided. The community's support of our 4-building district is appreciated; we need to invest now, and in the future, so equitable programming can be delivered 4K-12.

The past nine months have affirmed to us all, the critical role that schools serve to educate, feed, transport and keep students healthy and safe. We are extremely proud of our staff being able to keep our 4K-5 open to this point, and our secondary staff, students and families for adjusting through hybrid and virtual programming. Hope is on the horizon with vaccines and updated information.

MAKING HISTORY - GIRLS GOLF SECURES PRESCOTT'S FIRST STATE TITLE

Coach Salay wasn't sure there would even *be* a 2020 girls golf season, so it's even more astounding that the team played their matches, but also brought home Middle Border Conference and State Championship titles. "Once the season began, the next question was whether there would be a state tournament. WIAA wasn't able to commit until mid-season. We were very thankful that they (WIAA) made the entire season happen with detailed planning and safety measures in place," stated Salay who shared highlights of the season's historic wins and player profiles.

"During the season, the definite high was clinching the conference championship while shooting a school record at our last 9-hole conference meet in Baldwin. Although we did not officially clinch the conference championship, mathematically it was going to be very tough to lose it. Our girls knew this and we celebrated a bit; however, we still wanted to win the 18-hole conference final at New Richmond and that's what we did to clinch it! It was certainly a great feeling knowing we had ended the Tigers' five-year reign, as well as secured Prescott's first girls golf conference championship.

Additionally, 5 team players finished in the top 15 of the individual standings to earn an All-Conference status: 1st teamers; Ava Salay and Rhi Stutz, 2nd teamers; Liz Rohl and Jessica Heinsch, and Honorable Mention; Maddie Reiter. As a coach, I have never seen this happen before! The greatest moments of the state tournament came on the last five-six holes for our team. We were 'neck and neck' with defending champions, Madison Edgewood and Prairie School, for most of the day. On this last stretch of holes, our girls played their best golf. They put the pressure on the other teams who were unable to match our play.

I believe the highlight was on the final hole (one of the tougher driving holes on the course with a huge pond on the right and several large bunkers on the left side). Each of our players pounded their drives right down the middle of the fairway, while other teams drove into the water and bunkers. The players especially demonstrated razor-sharp mentality and heart on this hole. We had a comfortable last stretch to the victory - which wasn't so comfortable for most of the day!"

The solid lead also allowed Salay to check on where his daughter, Ava, was standing individually. He felt she was playing well enough to have a chance to win and knew she'd played in similar situations. Ava needed a birdie for the chance to tie on the last hole. She hit two great shots but came up a little short on her final putt. Ava took home a second place title for the second year in a row!


colleagues selflessly help one another and our students.

PLANNING GUIDE

The PHS Counseling Department knows that each student has a unique pathway to his or her future plans. Our staff is fully equipped to prepare all students for college and career readiness through a variety of lessons, meetings, tests, courses, and opportunities. It starts with monthly counseling lessons during homeroom where we meet with a large group of students to discuss a variety of topics pertaining to each grade level. We also offer individual counseling which allows us to dig deeper into each

student's plans and unique situation. During these sessions, we explore four-year planning, course schedules, letters of recommendation, timemanagement, study skills, work/life balance, essay writing, scholarships, loans/grants, FAFSA, and anything else relating to the student's needs.

Students have the opportunity to take a variety of courses and exams to help them accomplish their goals and feel prepared for life after high school. We partner with Chippewa Valley Technical College (CVTC) to offer a job shadowing program and transcripted credit courses, where students can receive college credit along with their high school credit. They can also receive college credit by taking Advanced Placement (AP) exams by taking the nine AP classes we offer. During sophomore and junior years, students can take the PSAT test in the fall. This test helps students see where they are at academically, if they are ready to take the ACT, and helps them gauge their college readiness. During a student's senior year, they can take our Mentorship class. This class is an independent course that gives students time to explore different career options and what they need to do to prepare for their pathway. Through this class, students take advantage of

job shadowing opportunities and scholarship applications.

Starting this year, we are offering a Peer Tutoring opportunity for students to help their peers who may need extra support in certain classes or subject areas. Not only does this help students who are struggling, but it also gives an opportunity for tutors to experience a new level of professionalism and responsibility.

In addition to our academic offerings, we provide many resources such as a career exploration site, college visits, job shadowing, and work release. Our career exploration



site, Xello, allows students to take personality tests and matchmaker questionnaires. After answering, they get a list of careers that match their interests and skills, then can then read more about those careers and save the ones they like. They can also use this site to explore different

colleges, track college applications, send transcripts to colleges, request letters of recommendation from their teachers, and see what local scholarships are available to them. Students can also take three days to job shadow. This is an opportunity to see careers first-hand to see if it is something they really would like to do, or if they should explore different options. If students have a job, we also offer a work release program that allows them to leave school early to work while receiving high school credit and gaining work experience and a paycheck!

Every student's journey varies which is why we have different opportunities to help out as many students as possible. We want every student to achieve their goals and graduate from high school feeling ready to take on the world. Through counseling lessons, meetings, exams, courses, and real-world experiences, we make sure our students are college and career ready before they receive their PHS diploma.
