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Reflections for a New Year By: Dr. Rick Spicuzza, Superintendent

Happy New Year to the Prescott Community! Traditionally, the arrival of a New Year signals us to simultaneously look backward in reflection and forward in preparation. It is a time to celebrate our successes, identify our challenges, and refine our course for the year ahead. As the senior class of 2019 counts down to a May 25th graduation, we will welcome Prescott's next batch of kindergarteners and the future graduating class of 2031 at registration on February 25. Where does the time go?

<u>A Time for Reflection.</u> Prescott, like many small districts, has labored under the constraints of strict state funding limits. These limited resources restricted the range and type of school-based programs and services we could offer our students. Moreover, financial constraints made it harder to recruit and retain high-quality staff.

<u>Rising to the Challenge.</u> Necessity is the mother of invention, and our financial needs spurred creative thinking. Here are four ways Prescott has improved its financial standing:

- Committed to a capital investment Fund 46 to address future big-ticket facility upgrades. We've been able to earmark \$300,000.00 for these future needs.
- Increased fund balance to address within-year cash flow and establish a contingency fund.
- Pursued grants for Mental Health and Safety programs to offset insufficient funding by the state to address these essential areas, bringing in more than \$225,000.
- For the first time in twenty years, loans were not needed to meet mid-year payroll obligations.

<u>Prescott's Future.</u> By securing financial breathing room, Prescott is able to invest its previously scarce dollars to better support student learning and innovative programs. With that in mind, here are a few enhancements in store for the Prescott Schools:

- Expanding the newly introduced STEM program.
- Anticipating future workforce trends to prepare a technologically competitive class of 2031 through newly designed course work.
- Investigating the addition of computer coding classes.
- Improving Prescott Community Recreation facilities and green spaces.

As you can see, many great things are happening for Prescott Schools. I encourage you to be part of the process and look forward to seeing you at our upcoming events.



Prescott Community Education continues the conversation...

Thanks to ongoing funding from grants, Prescott Community Education has added new topics for Community Conversations through the rest of this school year. Prior events included information on timely topics, such as gender identity, addiction, mental health, and suicide awareness. These events are free to attendees. Here is the schedule of upcoming events:



Tuesday, February 5, 6:30-8pm - The Opioid & Meth Crisis Prescott High School Performing Arts Center

Hear a family's journey of loss and healing, as well as what the signs & symptoms to opioid use are, withdrawal symptoms, side effects and what causes dependency. Our Pierce County Drug Investigator will also be joining us to talk specifically about the meth epidemic Pierce County is facing. Finally, Ron Schmidt, with the Pierce County Human Services Department, will tell us how the opiate/meth epidemic is affecting families and children, and what services are available. There will be time for Q&A.

February 27, 6:30-7:45pm - Digital Citizenship/Identity Theft Prescott High School Performing Arts Center

We will discuss what it means to be a good digital citizen, learn to be aware of your digital footprint, and how to protect yourself against identity theft. Quality resources will be shared for those talking with kids about this topic. Joan Simon & Erica Keezer, Prescott School District Media Specialists, as well as a representative from First National Bank will be our speakers. There will be time for Q&A.

March 21, 6:30-7:45pm - Celebration of Life: Organ, Bone Marrow & Blood Donations Prescott High School Performing Arts Center

Learn how organ donations, blood donations and bone marrow or stem cell donation can save someone's life. A LifeSource ambassador will share a personal story related to organ, eye and tissue donation or transplantation, as well as basic facts and information about donation. The American Red Cross will speak to the critical shortage of blood donations, how donations are used and how you can help. Be The Match will have a digital presentation addressing the rapid changes in bone marrow donations and how many of these donations can now be done by extracting stem cells from your blood. We'll end the evening with a Celebration of Life reception to honor those in our community who are donor recipients, or donors, and those with a family member that has "Checked the Box" and saved others' lives. Late April/May - Mental Health and the Transition to College (watch for details soon)

For some, the stress of college may impact mental health, making it difficult to manage the daily demands of school. Research shows that one in five students experiences a mental health condition while in college, and 75% of all mental health conditions begin by age 24. This conversation will help students and families learn how to connect to resources while beginning the often independent journey into the post-secondary world.

May 8, 6:30-7:30pm - Refugees & Resettlement



Prescott High School Performing Arts Center

This discussion will help create a greater understanding of the needs of refugees fleeing from persecution and beginning new lives in the United States. Our speaker, Yusuf Abdi, is the Program Director of Refugee Services for Lutheran Social Service of MN and a graduate of North Dakota State University. Yusuf has been affiliated with Lutheran Social Services since 2000, when his family received assistance to resettle in Pelican Rapids. In addition to sharing his own story of life as a refugee and a Muslim, he will share a number of resources. There will be time for Q&A. In conjunction with this Community Conversation and our Day of Service event on Saturday, May 4, we will be collecting "essentials" and school supplies/backpacks for regional refugees. 
Prescott Makes the Grade



Each year, school districts across the state and nation complete various assessments to measure effectiveness. Whether it is the Wisconsin Forward Exam, the ACT, FastBridge or other assessment, the results allow districts to evaluate important data that helps shape teaching methods, curriculum, interventions and other tools to increase teaching effectiveness and student learning. The depth of information can provide data comparisons to other districts, to compare results in a particular group of students over time and to compare results between classes of students from prior years.

When looking at the data to make comparisons, it's always important to consider not only the outcomes, but also any factors that might impact the data from year to year. Some of those factors might include whether the assessment tool itself was changed, if new benchmarks were identified or eliminated compared to prior years, and even if the timing of the test was different.

Michael Kosmalski, Director of Teaching & Learning recently did an in depth presentation to the school board about current test results. Overall, Prescott students continue to score well from year to year and in comparison with neighboring districts and the district continues to explore the data for ways to continually improve. Reminders from the Nurse

As the cold and flu season progresses, please keep in mind the 24 Hour Rule. Any time your child:

- · has a fever
- · has been put on antibiotics for any infection
- has pinkeye
- · has been vomiting
- or is just not getting better after being home sick

School policy is:

- Students need to be fever free and/ or illness free (haven't thrown up) for 24 hours or more before returning to school.
- Students need to stay home for 24 hours after the medications, eye drops, or antibiotics were started.

WHY? When students and staff stay home when they are sick it helps prevent the spread of illness to other students, staff and the community.

REMEMBER: Washing hands when soiled with lathering and good friction for a least 20 seconds and properly covering coughs and sneezes is the #1 way to prevent the spread of illness!


